Dear Stakeholders,

Greely Road Public School takes immense pride in serving Gregoire's students, families, and community. We are particularly proud of the diverse support we offer our students and families, including a wide range of after-school clubs, a nourishing breakfast program, engaging family nights, and our wonderful gains in literacy.

For the 2023-2024 school year, Greely Road School has a student population of 82 students, 3.5 teachers, a 0.25 counsellor, 0.5 LAC and 0.4 administration, as well as 6.5 EAs and an administrative assistant. All of our classes are combined as ECDP/K, 1/2, 3/4, and 5/6. We have a First Nations Metis and Inuit population of 19.5% (16), an English as an Additional Language population of 6% (5), and students utilizing an Individual Programming Plan account for 25% (21). Our early childhood population accounts for 22% (18) of our school population.

Greely Road School offers much to our students and community. In cooperation with the Islamic School, we can provide all sporting clubs to our students, as well as Tech and Trades clubs and Art clubs. Also, the students work diligently on leadership as we build our school culture. The breakfast club is a massive part of ensuring our students receive the best start of the day possible and offers a mixture of quick grab-and-go breakfast and, on occasion, a hot option; no child at Greely Road School will go hungry.

Our Alberta Education Assurance survey clearly shows that Greely Road School is a caring and safe environment. It has improved by 20% in education quality and grown by 14% in parental involvement. The same stakeholders see Greely Road School as a learning environment that promotes positive citizenship. Our Alberta Education Assurance Survey also shows we have improved in our Provincial Achievement Test results; however, this is still an area of growth.

We are proud of our improvement, but some areas require attention. The first area of progress that is being addressed is student mental health. This year, the staff worked diligently to improve student mental health by understanding our school and community context, using The Regulated Classroom, increasing parental communication, utilizing our school counsellor, and other training during our Professional Learning Fridays. However, our student anxiety levels are 8% higher than the national average. We will be introducing Positive Behaviour Intervention Supports, along with our current initiatives, come the 2024/2025 school year.

Literacy has been a growth area we have been celebrating with great pride. Two years ago, we had one student at grade level, and now 44% of our grade1-6 students are at grade level. In past years, our goals have been based on tier-three interventions with small pull-out groups and utilizing UFLI as our model. With the number of students requiring tier three support reducing, we have shifted our literacy goal from ensuring students are not requiring tier 3 support, to ensuring all students are at grade level. Still a literacy-focused goal, but a positive evolution of our journey due to the success we have had over the past two years.

At Greely Road School, our staff, parents, and students are united in their commitment to support our students. We firmly believe that the success of every Greely Road School student is a shared responsibility. This report is a testament to the collaborative efforts of Greely Road School's parents, staff, and students. Our students, staff, and parents all understand that our school is a place to foster love, learning, and leadership.

CURRENT STATE

STRENGTHS

Student citizenship has increased by 6.1% over the previous year, education quality is up 20.5%, and parental involvement is up by 13.5%, all above the provincial averages. We are also above the provincial average in access to support and services and welcoming and safe learning environments as per the latest AEA survey data.

OurSchool Survey report indicate a 5% increase in feeling safe at school and a 3% increase in interest and motivation

68.9% of our grade 4/5/6 parents have responded to our Spring 2023 AEA survey. A significant jump from our previous years response rate of 16.2%.

Literacy rates have increased significantly over the past two years. Moving from 2% of our students at grade level to 44% of students at grade level.

AREAS FOR GROWTH

Our 4/5/6 student body has a anxiety level 8% higher than the national average based upon the OurSchool survey. This is a 3% increase in anxiety from the previous spring results.

While we have made great progress in literacy skills among our students, 21% of our students require intensive literacy support as they are at risk.

LOCAL CONTEXT

Greely Road Public School takes great pride in serving Gregoire's students, families and community. Wwe work very hard with the community to serve the needs of our students, We are proud to offer intensive literacy support, a breakfast program, and numerous clubs in partnership with the Fort McMurray Islamic School.














- 37% of students in this school had moderate to high levels of anxiety; the Canadian norm for these grades is 29%.






Percentage of teachers, parents and students who are satisfied that students model the characteristics of active citizenship.


