

Dear Stakeholders,

Greely Road Public School proudly serves the students, families, and community of Gregoire. At Greely Road School, we are dedicated to creating an inclusive, supportive, and engaging learning environment where every student can succeed and grow. Our commitment to excellence is demonstrated through our diverse range of programs, an excellent Annual Education Results Report (AERR), and improvement in literacy and Provincial Achievement Test results.

Our dedicated staff, which includes five Alberta Teachers' Association members, seven CUPE Education Assistants, three custodians shared with the Fort McMurray Islamic School, and one administrative assistant. All work to create a welcoming and caring environment for every student. Currently, we serve 84 students, including 14 First Nations, Métis, and Inuit students, 8 English as an Additional Language learners, and those requiring additional support through Individual Program Plans (27 students), Learning Support Plans (18 students), and Behaviour Support Plans (5 students). We also have 7 students in our Early Childhood Development Program.

Greely Road Public School offers various initiatives to support student achievement and well-being. In collaboration with the Fort McMurray Islamic School, we provide enriching after-school clubs that promote creativity, teamwork, and personal growth. Our breakfast program ensures all students have the nutrition they need to start their day ready to learn. We also offer literacy support, technology and trades programs, and engaging family events designed to build a sense of community and belonging. We are proud to report that Greely Road School scored above the provincial average in nearly all categories measured through the 2024 AERR survey, a testament to our commitment to a growth mindset.

Our school benefits from the generosity and support of several community partnerships. Sponsors generously provide mittens and warm clothing to ensure our students are prepared for the winter months. At the same time, other local organizations support our families by sponsoring our Community Christmas Dinner each year, fostering a sense of warmth and community spirit.

As we look to the future, our unwavering focus remains on growth and development. We are deeply committed to professional learning and improvement. We utilize Professional Learning Fridays (PLF) to enhance our instructional practices and continuously support student success, focusing on the *Science of Reading* to improve literacy results and the *7 Habits of Highly Effective People*, and *The Regulated Classroom* to improve student anxiety. All of these initiatives aim to build a school where every child can find their way to learn, love, and lead.

CURRENT STATE

STRENGTHS

- oThrough our Assurance Measure Reports, Greely Road School, is rated excellent in parental involvement, citizenship and education quality. Greely Road School is above the provincial average in Access to Supports and Services. And while we are below provincial average in support for at risk students we are improving and closing the gap between us and other schools in the province.
- Based on our Greely Road School PAT data, our results have increased from 50% to 72.7% in terms of level of acceptance., a 45% year over year increase.
- •39% of students are at grade level for literacy, which is a large improvement from two years ago where we had 2% of students at grade level.

AREAS FOR GROWTH

- o While we have improved of literacy levels, we still need to maintain our focus on student literacy.
- Student Anxiety is still above the national average by 14%.

LOCAL CONTEXT

Greely Road Public School takes great pride in serving Gregoire's students, families and community. We work very hard with the community to serve the needs of our students, We are proud to offer intensive literacy support, a breakfast program, and numerous clubs in partnership with the Fort McMurray Islamic School.

STRATEGIES FOR MOVING FORWARD

- Studying the Seven Habits as it relates to Leader in Me.
- We will continue to enhance our literacy strategies.
- o Introduce Positive Behaviorial Interventions and Supports. (PBIS)

2. MATERIAL RESOURCES

- o The Seven habits of Highly Effective People, book study
- Resources to support literacy. (Reading Resources, gamification of literacy resources, cross cultural representative resources)
- Student regulation aides.

HUMAN RESOURCES

- o The LAC, in cooperation with the Principal, continues to do intensive literacy support.
- Expanding our knowledge of The Regulated Classroom program to staff, and introducing PBIS
- Staff understanding of and the ability to implement the "Leader In Me" philosophy.

Improvement Strategies to Address Gaps in Learning and Teacher Practice (Include Stakeholder Engagement)	Utilize literacy programs such as Science of Reading in grades 1-2 and Lexia in grades 3-6. Our team will continue to support students with universal /whole class strategies and small group & individual interventions such as read alouds, gamification of literacy, Daily Five and Empowering Writers. The Collaborative Response Model will be a renewed initiative during PLF time with the focus on in class literacy interventions and tier 1 and 2 supports. We will be purchasing inclusive reading materials at all reading levels. This data will be tracked on an in school spreadsheet for teachers to monitor student growth. Literacy groups have been set up and running based on LENS, CC3, Dibels utilizing UFLI. We will continue to share our literacy progress with parent council, and seek advice regarding increasing parent literacy support at the home level.

STRENGTHS

- Through our Assurance Measure Reports, Greely Road School, is rated excellent in parental involvement, citizenship and education quality. Greely Road School is above the provincial average in Access to Supports and Services. And while we are below provincial average in support for at risk students we are improving and closing the gap between us and other schools in the province.
- Based on our initial Greely Road School PAT data, results have increased by 46 % in terms of level of acceptance.
- 39% of students are at grade level for literacy, which is a large improvement from two years ago where we had
 2% of students at grade level.

AREAS FOR GROWTH

- While we have improved of literacy levels, we still need to maintain our focus on student literacy.
- Student Anxiety is still above the national average by 14%.

What did we do during 2023-2024 (last year's PLF plan)?

- To address literacy, Greely Road School changed the model of literacy support from Fountas and Pinnell to the University of Florida Reading Intervention program for students who required tier-three support. The support groups, classroom teachers, and parents communicated constantly. Our LAC and our Grade ½ teacher shared their work on what has worked best to date, transitioning to the science of reading.
- We read Ruby Payne's "A Framework for Understanding Poverty" (Ph.D.) to ensure our practices were equitable and that we had the proper perspective when supporting our students' growth.

ENGLISH AS AN ADDITIONAL LANGUAGE

The CC3, Lens, and Dibels will allow us to improve our reading and writing skills. The school LAC and
principal will support students with universal and targeted literacy inventions. Unfortunately, we do not
have provincial data on English as Additional Language Learners due to our low enrollment numbers in
grades four, five, and six.

FIRST NATIONS, MÉTIS, INUIT

 Ongoing school-wide focus on Applying Foundational Knowledge about First Nations, Metis, and Inuit: teacher developing and applying foundational knowledge about First Nations, Metis, and Inuit for the benefit of all students. A focus on supporting Reconciliation by including First Nations, Metis, and Inuit perspectives and experiences in classroom instruction. Unfortunately, we do not have provincial data on First Nations, Metis and Inuit students due to our low enrollment numbers in grades four, five and six.

What do we need to work at - the goals of our 2024-2025 education plan?

- Greely Road School will focus on lowering student anxiety, so we are at the national average of 29%, based on Our School Survey data.


